

## GPSVS AT A GLANCE

GPSVS showing its concern for sustainable development for poor community has focused in these financial years (2020-2021) on the issue of *Water, Sanitation & Hygiene, Climate Change, Natural Resource Management, Community Reproductive Health, Women led traditional health cultures for resilience to climate change induced disaster in north Bihar, DRR & flood preparedness, COVID-19 prevention & precaution (CAB) & environment protection and conservation, Access to Safe drinking water using WADI Approaches*. The poor and marginalized community which is suffering lot due to rapid climate change and natural resource degradation of land, water and forest and high risk on health. Realizing this fact Climate change adaptation and mitigation became the core issue cutting across all thematic areas like health, WASH, Natural resource management, Disaster Management, agriculture and other livelihood program. GPSVS intensified its past effort to promote Green Infrastructure like traditional water bodies, agro and social forestry, conservation of native environmental friendly plants and also developed health and nutrition garden for improving nutrition level as well as livelihood security. It intensified its awareness program on climate induced disaster particularly flood and drought. It has also intensified its program for mitigating the effect of climate change on health through the promotion of Traditional Health culture. It took steps to strengthen the capacity of CBOS like KMM/KMS, WASH committee, Farmers field school, CDMC, TBCF, VDMC and other on climate change mitigation and adaptation and link it with project activities. GPSVS organized state level workshop with the collaboration of BSDMA, ATMA & INGOs and other institutions to make climate change mitigation, water conservation, natural resource management and DRR program more effective. Through the various training, orientation and workshop & mockdrill, community people became more aware on the issues of flood preparedness, reproductive health, climate change induced disaster, covid-19 appropriate behavior, safe drinking water and WASH even at the country level. GPSVS has been formed farmer field school and school disaster management committee and community disaster committee. Throughout these years, small and marginalized farmers have improved their farming practices & strengthened through the introducing of vermin compost, mix cropping, Farmer Field School, health and nutrition garden, water-pest management.

Kasturba Mahila Samiti has strengthened its capacity further; it is better able to monitor the activities of 200 Kasturba Mahila Mandal. It has developed business plan for livelihood. Since last one and half years, KMM has been producing face mask, liquid soap for personal protection from COVID-19 pandemic and selling dry food. At the community level, GPSVS-KMM provided various training and orientation program for increase the capacity of small scale business and advocacy. WASH is the most important part of our daily living life. WASH practices & condition has further improved through awareness, training and construction of toilets and High raised platform around hand-pumps. For awareness on safe drinking water, accessing of safe drinking water, WASH, linkage with the government for advocacy, disaster risk reduction (prevention, mitigation), disaster preparedness, and response & recovery for their respective communities, we have formed 50 CDMCs groups in 50 villages. Each group entails 15 to 19 members including women's, men's, and PRIs members. We have also re-structured 35 villages CDMCs. These are the major achievements of these years. In future it will continue its effort for sustainable development in the context of changing climate and natural resource degradation.



## शुद्ध पेयजल उपलब्धता और बाढ़ पूर्व चैतावनी को लेकर कार्यशाला आयोजित

शोहरात प्रखंड विकास संगठन, जलसु, द्वारा 'एक्सिस टू सेफ ड्रिंकिंग वाटर' परियोजना के अंगीत सुरुक्षित पेयजल उपलब्धता एवं बाढ़ पूर्व चैतावनी को लेकर जल संवर्धनी, जल योद्धा कवरेजला कार्यक्रम का आयोजन प्रखंड स्तर किया गया. कार्यक्रम का अयोजन बाढ़बरोती के टीमेंसो भवन में अयोजित किया गया. कार्यक्रम मुख्य रूप से जल संवर्धनी जल योद्धा तथा प्रखंड प्रतिनिधि के बीच उयोक्त विषय पर प्रखंड स्तर पर सार्वकियण के लिए क्या किया गया. जेपीएसवीएस जिला के जनरल, बाढ़बरोती, खजौली और अंतरराज्यी के 50 गांवों में डब्ल्यूएचएर (केयुएनएडिआर) के सारथी से सुरुक्षित



उपलब्धता में मौजूद लोग.

पेयजल कि उपलब्धता परियोजना पर कम कर रही है. सभी गांव कमला नदी बेसिन के अंदर और बाहर स्थित हैं. समुदाय के लोग हर साल बाढ़ जैसी विभिन्न चुनौतियों का सामना कर रहे हैं. पानी की गुणवत्ता को कमी के बावजूद सुरुक्षित स्वच्छता और स्वच्छता प्रयासों के बारे में जनसरो को अभाव है.

कार्यक्रम में साफ जल एवं बाढ़ पूर्व बाढ़ कि नियरी जल संवर्धनी जल योद्धा के द्वारा समुदाय खासकर महिला, सार्वकियक कार्यकर्ता तथा पंचायत राज्य संस्था को भूमिका पर विस्तार से चर्चा की गई. लोनी तक शूद्र पानी कैसे पहुंचा जाए तथा पंचायत सदस्य और जल संवर्धनी, जल योद्धा तथा सैडिएससी सदस्य को इसमें

क्या भूमिका होगी, इस पर विस्तार रूप से ध्यान केंद्रित किया गया. बाढ़ो बाढ़ पूर्व चेतावनी के सात सूचकों पर विस्तार रूप चर्चा की गई. बैठक में 30 जल संवर्धनी, जल योद्धा ने भाग लिया. संस्था के और से उमेश कुमार, सार्वकिय दास, सविंदर कुमार, चंद्र रेखा देवी, मोहम्मद अताउल्लाह ने भाग लिया.



**Capacity Building Training & Strengthening of CDMCs:-** For awareness on safe drinking water, accessing of safe drinking water, WASH, linkage with the government for advocacy, disaster risk reduction (prevention, mitigation), disaster preparedness, and response & recovery for their respective communities, we have formed 50 CDMCs groups in 50 villages. Each group entails 15 to 19 members including women's, men's, and PRIs members. We have also re-structured 35 villages CDMCs.

**Capacity Building Training of Jal Saheli and Jal Yoddha:-** The key objective of the capacity building training was to critically sensitize the community Jal Saheli and Jal Yoddha "Improving Access to safe drinking water and WASH at the community level and establish the strong advocacy with PRIs members, Block Official department and its interrelationship with other stakeholders and their role to develop their functional competencies effectively and efficiently.

**Interface Dialogue with the community and elected representatives:** - Community people are suffering from various challenges like every year facing to flood, lack of water quality and Govt. pipe water supply system even there has lack of knowledge about the safe sanitation and hygiene practices. Due to lack of availability and knowledge, community people are practicing open defecation even those who have built of the toilet in these areas, there has created some major problems and seen to the side effect of water quality. Due to unplanned construction of toilet, groundwater resource is being contaminated as result community people are suffering from water-borne diseases. One major issue is that devastating flood creates more vulnerability to livelihood, health, education, communication. Most of the people's income source is dependent on the farming practices – Nonfarm and off farm. Flood damage this practice as cause community people used to go outside to earning purpose as migrants' labor.

**Engagement of Youth through WASH Activity by Jal Saheli and Jal Yoddha:** -Health and Hygiene are important to reduce diseases. In the present situation, community people are living in filthy conditions, most of the time children were taking food in unhygienic conditions. GPSVS is promoting WASH practices through hand washing, use of toilets; improve the drinking water source, and also providing knowledge about how to reduce contamination of drinking water. In this period, GPSVS conducted various WASH-related programs such as how to wash hands with 6 effective steps, conservation of rainwater harvesting, improving hygiene behavior and promoting toilet construction through the linkage with PRIS and PHED department.

**Rashtriya Poshan Maah:-** The 4th Rashtriya Poshan Maah is being celebrated during September 2021. Every year the Poshan Maah is celebrated under POSHAN Abhiyaan (PM's Overarching Scheme for Holistic Nourishment), The objective of the Poshan Maah is to ensure community mobilization and bolster people's participation in addressing malnutrition amongst young children, and women and ensure health and nutrition for everyone. Poshan Abhiyaan overall intends to increase nutritional awareness and responsiveness among mothers of young children, adolescent girls, pregnant and lactating women, family



members including husbands, fathers, mothers-in-law and community members, health care providers (ANM, ASHA, Anganwadi worker) about vital nutrition behaviors.

**Workshop Training on Water Security Master Plan (WALMI - Bhopal):-** Water And Land Management Institute organized a 2-day Workshop on Regenerating Natural Capital Land, Water (security Master Plan), and Forest. This workshop was organized by WALMI, Bhopal on 09th and 10th July 2021. In this workshop, WADI district fellows, Pankaj Kumar, Prakash Kumar, and Ravindra

Kumar represent GPSVS. It's great learning for the WADI team and community, we have mapped out the areas where we have to implement the Water user Master plan, also we have involved it in the village development plan for the sustainable result and development of the village. At the community level, we have discussed it with the CDMCs members, Jal Saheli & Jal Yoddha/Jal Doot, Community leader, and elected RPIs. They appreciate the methods of the Water user Master plan.

**WADI Project Review Meeting (Jhansi):-** Two days Project Review meeting was organized by WHH in Jhansi on 12th July 2021 and 13th July 2021. GPSVS (WADI Project team members and PARMATH team) participated. In two days review meeting both organization presented their project progress on day one and day second we have prepare our Action Plan, presented our action plan, also intending to learn regarding the work process of Jal Saheli, the team members visited one village and establish a healthy conversation with Jal Saheli and community in the context of Jal Saheli work, how we can replicate this in our project area (Madhubani, Bihar) so, that we can also achieve our project goal objective. Sh. Vijay Roy (WHH) presented a brief about the project, strategy for achieving the target of the project, and also focuses on the other important segment of the project. A brief discussion was made during the project meeting on the effective implementation and sustainability of the project. It was great learning and interexchange learning for both the organization team members.

**WADI Orientation and Project Evaluation:-** On 21st Sept 2021 to 24th Sept 2021 Sh. Vijay Kumar Roy visited GPSVS, Jagatpur headquarter. During the visit, Mr. Vijay Kumar Rai from WHH, Mr. Ramesh Kumar Singh (GPSVS), and the entire team of the WADI project team participated. The Objective of the project evaluation was to contemporaneous status and progress of the project "Access to Safe Drinking Water is using WADI Approaches".



The project is focusing on strengthening water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) among rural communities, working in close cooperation with the Government in schemes such as Jal Jeevan Mission, Har Ghar Nal Ka Jal, Jal Jeevan Hariyali Mission through and Post Swachh Bharat Mission. The aforementioned project aims to bring lasting behaviour change and promoting adoption of positive behaviors through SABC activities and by working on Access Behavior and Capital for sustainability.

#### Overview of COVID-19 response work progress

School & AWC was used quarantine Centre during the period of lockdown and when migrants labour came back to their native place, that time they could not go to their home directly. In the meantime, they stayed at School & AWC for 14 days. During this time, school hand pump and toilet used and there is required to retrofitting of WASH infrastructure. 15 schools and 10 AWCs drinking water resource infrastructure has been improved by the construction of hand pump raised cemented platform, hand pump repairing, soak pit for drainage and some of school and AWC hand washing basin was installed for hygiene practices improving to children, teachers, AWW and other people.

#### Coordination with Govt. officials & PRIs

GPSVS team members coordinated with local CBOs, PRIs and Govt. officials to share about the COVID-19 response works to be initiated with the Kind support of Water Aid. We have met with CDPO, BEO, BDO, Block Pramuk, MLA and PRIs members.

9 Bellha AWC

Before there was no platform and soakpit for waste water management but now platform and soakpit has constructed. Hand pump 3 nuts and washer has been changed before it was damaged. Now AWC & community people are using this hand pump water



10 JalsainAWC

Hand washing basin has been installed at jalsain AWC. Before there was no hand washing facility in this centre now AWC children, pregnant and lactating mother are getting this hand washing facility. Right now there is 35 children and 18 pregnant & 8 lactating mother.

## Covid- 19 Response-Project through WASH & DRR interventions in Supaul and Purnea District- Bihar

**Supported by-UNICEF**

### **Background:-**

The district Supaul is most vulnerable to multi disasters. Its history tells that, the district has been faced flood, fire, Earthquake Thundering, Cyclone and other disasters in previous years. This year the district has been badly affected from the Covid-19 pandemic. Taking seriousness on these issues, the organization (GPSVS) started the different intervention to reduced the risks from Covid-19 infection along with flood risks under the project title i.e. Covid-19 response, flood preparedness, response and recovery in both districts with the help of Unicef Bihar and in coordination with district administration. The interventions have been made in the four blocks from both districts in two phases. In the 1st phase, intervention initiated from May 2020 to August 2020 with specific focus on prevention of Covid -19 infections at QCs as well as in community through enhancing the knowledge, practices and behaviors. In 2nd phase the intervention carried out for the Covid-19 response related activities along with flood preparedness, response and recovery in four blocks of two districts as Supaul and Purina- Bihar.

During the Period, the project team was more focused to disinfection drives and chlorination of HPs, disinfection of AWCs, Schools and villages. Creating awareness campaignsfor flood affected community, as well as on Covid-19 infections prevention steps and process in the intervention area. Orientation of Women, adolescents, youths and children, PRIs and other stake holders to make aware on do, s and don'ts, MHM, WASH, IPC, flood preparedness, minor repairing related intervention have been carried out.Training to the different stakeholders at block level on EPR, flood preparedness and social sector recovery was also a component. The team made effort to providing handholding support to the line department for developing the risk informed GPDP in the selected GPs of intervention blocks. These events organized at the villages as well as GPs and block level with community and different stakeholders.

### **Output: - 1 Risk Communication and Community engagement.**

Activity-1.1- Covid-19 response along with flood preparedness response and recovery was a little challenge to minimize the risks from both the disasters. Underthese activities,GPSVS organized total 52 meeting/trainings/orientation with different target group's like- Community, Mothers, children/ adolescents', PRIs, Religious leaders for Covid and Flood related message dissemination and orientation in the intervention villages. Resulted 1503 nos of people reached through these meetings from the both blocks of the district.

Activity-1.2- There are many existing platform which are running under different government department. GPSVS made coordination with these platforms and engaged the different stake holders to dissemination of awareness messages on Covid-19 infection prevention like- use of masks, hand washing, following physical distancing etc and for flood preparedness we have made aware to the community on identification of high places, dry food, fodder for animals, boat repairing, new boat arrangement, raised toilets, vaccination, continuation of services related and health, WASH and nutrition, etc in all the intervention villages. During the project period the project team conducted 52 nos of event and reached to 5506 people to make aware on both topics. The details are given in below graph.



Activity -1.3- To minimizing the risks from Covid-19 and flood effects organization decided to create the awareness generation in all the most vulnerable villages of intervention blocks. This awareness campaign organized at public places like- market places, religious places, villages through micking, pamphlets, and brochures. During the project period we have reached to 93307 against 91000 targeted persons through 97 events.

Activity -1.4- During the project implementation period it has been seemed that Inter personal communication session was very useful to reach the last vulnerable person of the society or in remote villages. Taking importance of this media the project team organized awareness generation sessions on different issues with different groups like flood preparedness (as identification of safe places, dry food, shelter places, safe drinking water points, animal vaccination, education in emergency, fodder for animals etc) , prevention of Covid- 19 infections, MHM and schemes related to Covid- 19 packages , which has been declared by the government. Under this intervention especially those women and girls covered who has very less exposure of television and social media and are engaged in agriculture field. Total 4647 IPC session organized through different media like- Phone calls, whatsapp and one to one and one to groups and 9088 people covered and make aware for the same.



Activity-1.5- During the project period team made coordination with Jeevika team at district, block and field level to make aware on the Covid-19 infection prevention and control like- use of masks, physical distancing and hand washing practices. Apart from this the team directly given training to the Jeevika didis, leaders and functionaries, PRIs and religious leaders, NYKS, NSS, Red Cross Volunteers and PRI on Covid-19n response and flood preparedness and facilitated to make community awareness engagement plans for each batch of the participants. As per our observation it has been observed that as per their engagement plans, all these trained personals have been organized the awareness activities in their own villages/hamlets for the community. The details are given here.

Activity-1.6- Team GPSVS regular made contact with different stakeholders at block and district level and mutually discussed on the engagement plans with Jeevika team, NYKS, NSS, Red Cross volunteers and PRI members to create awareness at block as well as village level to more effectiveness of the intervention . In this sequences developed block and district wide community engagement and mobilization plan with them. The district youth Coordinator of NYKS, Secretary of Red cross and Jeevika functionaries all these three have taken initiatives to give training of their volunteers with the help of our trained subject experts. These all trained persons have been assured to provide training on Covid- 19 infections prevention and flood preparedness related message dissemination in their working area.



Activity-1.7- It has been observed that from last five years youths are much friendly with social media. To use the potentials of youths and adolescents in awareness generation activities organization provided training to them on use of what's app, creation of groups, role of admin of the groups, passing the awareness messages through groups etc. The organization have been ensured to provide the IEC materials like- do's and don'ts on Covid-19 infection prevention, flood preparedness and response related checklist etc to the group members. After the training it has been found that all these trained adolescent and youths are disseminating the messages in others groups.

#### Output-4:-WASH Preparedness and Response to Floods.

Activity 4.1 In targeted blocks 130 villages have been got affected from the heavy water logged or flood. Due to this the wash facilities at community as well as institutions like- Panchyat Bhawan, AWCs, HSCs, Community toilers have been affected and the services are like

unavailable. After the flood GPSVS team meet with PHED and in the coordination with him damage assessment exercise conducted in the flood/water logged affected villages. The details are given here.

Activity 4.2- All the Gram Panchants prepared Gram Panchyat Development Plans (GPDPs) of Panchyat. As per the previous experience they do not prepared, WASH focused GPDP in the context of flood and water logged situation. To ensure the wash focused GPDP we provided training to 132nos of the PRIs members and front line functionaries of the both blocks as Basantpur and Chatapur. After training these PRIs members have been collected the WASH related issues like- safe drainage, safe sock pit, hand washing facilities, safe community toilet related issues have been taken in the plans.



Activity 4.3- Covid-19 pandemic given a new learning in the society in the sense of prevention of infections through following the physical distancing, using of masks and hand washing practices. On the demands of schools that are situated in the flood/heavy water logged affected area and use as relief/shelter camps during disasters/flood/heavy water logged situation, GPSVS provided 6 no touch hands free hand washing station in the schools. it was one time support from the organization. Its repairing, maintenance and management would be ensuring by the school administration. The details are given here.

In the above graphs its reflecting that we have achieved the target of no hand touch washing status as in 13 we have provided Six big size of hand washing stations and at 7 sites we have provided small hand washing equipment with soap at existing hand washing points in the same nos of schools.

Activity 4.4- In flood affected there was a big issues for the women, adolescent and girls to manage the water, sanitation, hygiene and to manage the menstrual hygiene especially in those villages who were suffering from flood or heavy water logged. There was a little challenge in the community to accessing the sanitary pads and soaps in intervention villages. To minimizing the risks on these issues the project team organized training and awareness activities with them and as per needs provided hygiene kits to the most vulnerable families. The details are given here.

**Output- 5 Technical Assistance to District Administration in Flood Response and Recovery**

Activity 5.1- During the flood time there were three relief camps have been established by the district administration. Our team visit and monitored the relief camps and provided feed backs to the concerned Cos of the flood affected blocks of the district. After this the project team provided assistance in flood relief camps activities like safe drinking water, cleaning and hand washing , masks and initiated to following the physical distancing at the camps.

Activity 5.3- Although the flood time in the district was a very short duration but the heavy water logged was approx 20-25 days in the district. During the flood time there were three relief camps have been established by the district administration. during the meeting with government officials its has been decided and established child friendly space at three relief camps/community kitchen sites and remaining 13 flood shelters/community kitchen sites/schools the team displayed the IEC materials' like- wall writing related child friendly space.

Activity 5.3 – During the flood time it has been observed that Out of 3, at one relief camp there is a small space to establishing the facilities for breast feeding for the babies and temporary ANC corner. In this regards the project team make coordination with ICDS in creating Breastfeeding and ANC corner in every relief camps and provided hand holding support to them for establishing the ANC corner and breast feeding space at the one camp.

Activity 5.4- During the flood time there were only three temporary relief camps/ community camps have been established by the government. to ensure the awareness of the flood affected community At eighteen flood shelters/ relief camps/ community kitchen centers, IEC materials and wall writings were displayed related on flood and Covid-19 infection prevention steps, drowning prevention, boat safety and safety in relief camps.

Activity 5.5-During our observation visit at relief camps/ community kitchen centers it has been found that in all the three centers children registration ensured by in charge of the centers. In the all process the project team provided hand holding support to the camp in-charge and other front line functionaries.



Activity 5.7- During our field support visit its has been observed that those families who faced the flood and due to Covid- 19 effects suffering in very pressure to cope the both disasters at one time. The families head were in tension and their children also found in fearful conditions. The experts of project team contacted with those families and provided physio –social supports to 260 families to revival of their social and mental life. Now all are living their lives as normal.

Activity 5.8- In flood affected area team organized awareness generation events and disseminated the messages on the prevention of infections from Covid- 19 along with flood preparedness and rehabilitation related need to the affected families. This event carried out through regular miking, awareness meeting with community in most flood/water logged affected village. The details are given here.

Activity 5.9- In flood heavy water logged situation the assets of government institutions like- AWCs, Schools had been damaged. To find out the damage level of assets its restoration we assisted to the ICDS and Education department in damage assessment of AWCs and schools infrastructure, facilities, equipment etc in both blocks of intervention district. The assessment has been initiated by the both departments and hand holding support provided by our team members in all the flood affected villages.

## OUTPUT 6: Enhanced Flood and Related Emergency Preparedness

Activity 6.1- To ensure the enhancing the district specific flood emergency preparedness plans, discussion made with District Magistrate- Supaul. He suggested organizing meeting with one by one departmental meet and discussing on the existing plans, finding the gaps and provides input to strengthening of plans. In this regards we met with ICDS, Education, PHED, DCPU, DRDA and DDMA. During the meeting the team finds out the gaps and provided input to them. Resulted these five departments have been strengthened their emergency preparedness plans.


Activity 6.2- Generally all the departments prepare their departmental annual plans to provide the services to community and target groups. There is a big gap in their plans. I.e. different disasters like- flood, fire, earthquake, thunderstorm, Cyclone wash and climate change related risk factors not incorporate by them in these plans. In this regards the experts of GPSVS provided technical training to fivedepartment’releted district/ block level functionaries of Health, ICDS, Education, DCPU, PHED, DRDA, PRD etc on disaster preparedness and social sector recovery. As per suggestions of District magistrate one to one orientation made with block level officials andfront line functionaries on emergency preparedness and social sector recovery. After training all these are collectedthe data related to damage. Details are given here.



Activity 6.3- The history if the witnessed that our both intervention blocks are most vulnerable to flood and water logged. To prevention of risks from flood and heavy water logged situation an intensive flood preparedness campaign organized in the coordination with district and block administration in 130 most flood/water logged affected villages of the both blocks. The project teams, volunteers, PRIs, DRR catalysts and government frontline functionaries have been taken lead to crate the awareness on flood preparedness.



Activity 6.4-Capacity building is a major part of the any disaster preparedness. Those community who have well capacitated, there is less or no risks. In this regards organization provided training to the Jeevika functionaries and didis, NYKS and other volunteers on flood preparedness and response. After training all these trained participants are providing training to concerned persons/staffs and target groups.

Bihar is prone to thunderstorms and extreme weather conditions during heavy monsoon seasons of the year, but 2020's intensity of such strikes has been more severe than normal. With rapid climate change and unpredictable rainfall patterns, the state witnessed surplus rainfall leading to a huge rise in the water levels of rivers across Bihar. On June 22, 2020 the National Disaster Management Authority warned Bihar of —severe floodl situation putting many areas in the state under red alert. Moreover, on 25th and 26th of June, 2020 Bihar witnessed havok and irreversible damages by a severe lightning and thunderstorm claiming the lives of many and damage to properties and livestock. The victims include farmers in open fields and children playing outdoors. As per the official data, at least 83 people were killed in Bihar<sup>1</sup>. The states announced ex-gratia amount of Rs 4 lakh for the victims and asked the citizens to heed the thunderstorms warnings. GPSVS proposed the project of “Relief and Rehabilitation of the families affected by the thunderstorm and heavy rain in Bihar, India.” For the submitting of proposal, GPSVS regularly communicated with GRAVIS and shared all the information and community level data related to affect HHs, population, village, block and age group.

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### Health Camp overall progress and impact on community health

One day health and hygiene camp for thunderstorm & heavy rain fall was very much essential during the disaster time. GPSVS organized health care camp at different villages. In these camps total number of patients were 862 among them 454 was female and 408 was male. In this camp, patients were screened and provided medicines. The patients were screened by the MBBS doctor. The community people continued practicing open defecation because sanitation facilities were completely damaged by heavy rainfall & water logging and affected people had drink contaminated water which has created water borne diseases and even those who has burned by thunderstorm, they got health services from this health camp. In this health camp, most of the patients were suffered from water borne disease like diarrhoea, skin diseases & seasonal disease and burned hand and leg by thunderstorm.



All these villagers were badly affected by the thunderstorm and water logging and heavy rain fall. In most of the villages where we conducted healthcare camps, infection was the commonly found illness.

The current disaster had facilitated the spread of several diseases, such as gastroenteritis and skin diseases, sore, pain stomach problem, burning body. This was primarily due to their long term contact with the contaminated water and the use of polluted drinking water. The basic objective of this health camp program was to address the basic health care facility that is arising after normal situation. Village level intervention with primary health care service was initiated with the help of GPSVS – GRAVIS and MBBS doctor. In this health care camp, it was found that most of Female (pregnant and lactating mothers & elderly people and elderly people took health care service of cold, fever, cough and water borne diseases. All together, 862 patients were diagnosed and provided consultation for better health services among them 454 was female and 408 was male. During this Health camp ASHA, ICDS, ANM and other front line health worker were presented.

## Refurbishing/Renovation of 7 Flood Affected Government Schools in Madhubani District of Bihar

The Kamala & Bhutahiblan river flood have affected to school infrastructure, toilet, furniture, materials and drinking water facility. According to the situation, IGSSS have released fund of LIC HFL for Refurbishing/Renovation of 7 Flood Affected Government Schools in Madhubani District of Bihar project, which has implemented by Ghoghardiha Prakhand Swarajya Vikas Sangh (GPSVS). The project has carried out in all 7 schools in 3 blocks. Through this project, Children of all damaged school & community people have increased knowledge on WASH & DRR issues. Schools were badly Damaged during floods and needs small/minor repairs work so that children can delightfully continue their education and enhance their learning ability. After the completing all the activities and renovation and refurbishing of schools damaged, it has handed over to the government authorities in an event and took the stakeholder's feedback. As per the work priority & budget, bill of quantity (BOQ) has been prepared by PHED department retired engineer (Shri GhuranYadav). After the completing of all work, GPSVS has organized one day "Lokarpan Samarah", this event inaugurated by Chief Guest Shri RampritMandal (Member of Parliament, Jhanjharpur), Special Guest Smt. Sikha Srivastava (Director-IGSSS), Shri Ramesh Kumar (Chairman – GPSVS), BDO, BEO and other guests.



### Process of Implementation of all work & Inauguration:-

- Flood affected School has been identified by the GPSVS team members and IGSSS has been visited to proposed flood affected schools. GPSVS team members conducted meeting with community people & school teacher and local level PRIs representatives for identifying the work and finalized work priority on the basis of approval budget.
- 7 schools work measurement has done by Engineer and before situation pictures was collected and filling.
- NOC and appreciation letter was collected from Govt. official, school teacher and School education board committee
- After the finalized all work, EOI has been released for finalizing the contractor as per the rate of quotation and Sh. Manaj Kumar was selected by the IGSSS & GPSVS team members on the basis of quotation analysis.
- Bala printing was painted in 7 flood affected school for improving student learning attitude and behavior. School building was color painted and branding board was installed with the sign of donor logo.
- DRR & WASH awareness program was conducted with the community and school students in different village. Through this awareness program, community people were improved their basic knowledge about the flood preparation.
